Boishakhi Mela, the Bengali New Year Festival, drew almost 10,000 people to Sydney's Olympic Park Athletics Centre last Saturday. The festival provided AQIS with the perfect opportunity to show the local Bengali community why Quarantine Matters! More...

AQIS NSW, Bengali-speaking officer Akm Rahman and public relations officer Louise Bonny attended the lively celebrations focused on their mission to educate festival-goers about the importance of quarantine.

Quarantine officers at Sydney's international airport and mail centre often seize items such as sweets containing milk, seeds, and fresh fruit and vegetables from Bengali passengers and mail. These items could be harbouring a number of quarantine risks, including foot-and-mouth disease, citrus canker and other plant pathogens.

The AQIS stand displayed a range of Bangladeshi dairy sweets such as chom chom, kachagolla, rasgulla, shandesh and peara. These are commonly seized by AQIS, and festival-goers learnt about the danger these sweet, milky treats may hold for Australia's livestock industries.
